We hope you find Neighbourhood News informative and helpful.



Preview of The Christie proton beam therapy centre



The building works to the proton beam therapy (PBT) centre are now complete and staff are preparing the building before we open to patients in the autumn.

Members of the public, staff, patients and residents had the opportunity to attend preview tours of the new facility as part of a public open day and a series of guided tours.

The Christie opened its doors to the public as the Trust concluded its NHS 70th anniversary celebrations with an open day, on Saturday 28th July.

Visitors had the chance to see behind the scenes of Europe's largest single site cancer centre, which included tours of the UK's first NHS high energy proton beam therapy centre.

There were also tours of the Integrated procedures unit and the chance to see how the Trust's state of the art surgical robots deliver cutting edge treatment. Tours of The Christie's National Institute for Health Research clinical research facility were also available.

The Christie garden was open and the complementary therapy team was on hand to offer massage taster sessions. There was also an NHS 70 display in the conservatory along with the opportunity to contribute to a large mosaic artwork that will be displayed in the hospital.

The tour of the proton beam therapy centre included a visit to one of the treatment gantries, a scanning room, the dedicated paediatric area and the research room.

Christie experts were on hand to explain how PBT works and the benefits to patients who currently have to travel abroad for this treatment. Members of the proton research team were also on hand to explain how their research will aim to improve the

outcomes for patients both in terms of survival and

quality of life.

Local resident, Marjorie McSweeney attended a tour on the 30th July. She said: "When you think about those patients that have had to travel abroad for this treatment, it is tremendous that we now have this equipment here and the expertise to go with it."

Neighbour Jane Bracewell who was also in attendance, added: "It's a very impressive building and it is great to see how well it has been designed with the end user in mind, particularly children. I was surprised to hear that approximately a third of the patients treated in this centre will be children."



The ground floor of the new proton beam therapy centre will be home to a new outpatients' department. We are also completing the external works at the front of the building including planters and footpaths. This will enable the perimeter fencing to be removed and the footpaths to both sides of Oak Road to be re-opened.

We hope that those of you who attended the open day or a tour of the PBT centre found it interesting. If you didn't get chance to join one of the tours, some additional tours will be available on Thursday 6 September. Car parking

We have recently relocated our park and ride scheme to the Withington Community Hospital site on Nell Lane.

This new site offers better facilities for our staff that use the park and ride service including CCTV coverage and 24-hour security. It is also closer and more accessible, and we hope that this will encourage more staff to use the service. The park and ride service remains free to all of our staff and contractors.

Manchester City Council (MCC) is currently undertaking local surveys to enable a review and

extension of the controlled parking zone. We will continue to work with the City Council to drive forward the expansion as we appreciate the impact that staff parking has on neighbouring streets.

MCC has previously approved the planning application for the development of a new tiered car park on Cotton Lane. This new car park will provide an additional 407 car parking spaces. We are currently working up plans to build this car park and we will provide much greater detail once these plans have been developed.

Resurfacing of Oak Rd

Once we have completed building works we will be resurfacing Oak Road in late September.

This will also include the resurfacing of the footpaths to both sides of Oak Road and a section of Palatine Road from Oak Road to the multi-storey car park.

We will let you know the final details in the next edition of Neighbourhood News.

Paterson redevelopment

Following the fire last year at the Paterson building we are commencing work to remove the damaged plant and debris from the fire damaged roof.

You will see a number of cranes around the site that are needed to lift the heavy equipment off the roof.

We anticipate that demolition will begin towards the end of the year. We will be installing panels to cover the existing blue hoardings on Wilmslow Road and these will be erected by the beginning of September.

We are still developing plans for the redevelopment and further information will be available on our website.

Stockport cycle challenge

Recently, Chair of the neighbourhood forum, Councillor Andrew Simcock and performance and quality development manager at The Christie, Christopher Noble met up at Stockport Railway Station on their bikes before work, to test ride the commute to The Christie.

Concerns were raised at the last quarterly meeting with Manchester City Council about cars parking on cycle ways along the route from Stockport to Manchester, so the pair were keen to test out the route along the Trans Pennine Trail.

Whilst the initial part of the journey, directly from the station, was by road on a cycle lane in the middle of Stockport; within five minutes they were going under the extremely slow queuing M60, on the Trans Pennine Trail route.

Chris said: "The Christie is easily accessible from Stockport.

The route we took was a great bike ride in its own right, let alone a ride to work avoiding congestion and car fumes.

Andrew and I both estimated it's a comfortable half an hour ride. We will be recommending it to staff as a better route and much safer than riding on the roads."

Earlier this year, the Trust held a special week of cycling events to support staff members who cycle or are considering cycling.

The week was centred on the opening of the new expanded cycle hub two. The hub originally had 20 secure cycle spaces, this has now been expanded to 100. Daily tours took place of all the cycling facilities onsite. In addition there were bicycle user group meetings, a cyclist breakfast and free bicycle maintenance.
